









14 MONTHS OF WAR. GENERAL SITUATION IN UKRAINE



- **~14,5M** people are estimated to need <u>health assistance</u>
- **~50%** of healthcare facilities in the eastern and southern regions are partially or completely non-functional

- **~23,000** <u>civilian</u> casualties, including **~8,700** killed
- ~5,000 missile strikes,
- ~3,500 air attacks,
- ~1,100 drone attacks



- **~959** <u>attacks</u> on HCFs, warehouses, transport, supplies
- **~1,300** <u>HCFs</u> were damaged, **174** of them cannot be recovered

>65% of PLHIV get HIV through sexual contact

~245,000 people living with HIV (PLHIV)


~121,000 PLHIV are receiving antiretroviral therapy (ART)

~158,000 PLHIV under medical supervision

No person living with HIV left behind: how patient organisations work during the war



The war left tens of thousands of PLHIV remained at risk of treatment interruption. Prolonged air raids and shelling, forced relocations and loss of contact with their doctors, complicated logistics of drug delivery, and lack of access to health care in temporarily occupied territories and war zones. Despite everything, however, testing and identifying of PLHIV continued thanks to one of the largest public health projects HealthLink "Accelerating Ukraine's Efforts to End HIV".



"We have worked all this time, non-stop. Our main goal is to do our best to ensure that people on antiretroviral therapy do not stop receiving it. And they came on foot, they came on bicycles for 20 km. Those who were not registered in Chernihiv were ready to make their way to Kyiv through the woods to avoid treatment interruption. For me, this was the greatest recognition of the work of our social workers, because it means that they succeeded in strengthening people's adherence to treatment."

Training for family doctors in Lviv

- 300 primary care doctors in Lviv have already been trained in HIV testing and counselling and received the corresponding points under the continuing professional development programme
- we want every resident of the Lviv region to have the opportunity to find out their HIV status quickly, confidentially and free of charge
- more than 250,000 IDPs live in the region



HE LEARNED ABOUT HIS HIV-POSITIVE STATUS DURING THE WAR AND CONTINUED TO DEFEND UKRAINE

36-year-old Denys and his wife have been together for 12 years. There was always trust in their relationship; they made many plans for the future. Now the man is fighting in the Donetsk region. He recalls how his wife complained on the phone that she had suddenly lost weight and had an on-and-off fever. Denys insisted that she go to the family doctor for an examination. This is how the woman found out that she had HIV and started treatment. She called Denis and said, "Please find an opportunity to take an HIV test. You and I have dreamed of having a son. We still have a future."

Denys didn't wait for the rotation to get tested. "I googled where to test for HIV in the Donetsk region, found the contact details of the Ukrainian Resource Centre, and went there. The test result was positive. I reacted calmly because my wife had already told me about the medicines, which are free and available even in wartime. I was registered, and ART was prescribed."

The man was worried that he wouldn't be able to continue his military service. However, he was simply transferred to a place where contact with blood could be avoided. Denys is constantly in touch with a social worker and, whenever possible, comes to the organisation's office or her home to collect medication.

"My wife and I have been dreaming of a son for a long time. Now, as the war rages on, our dreams are even more steadfast; life has more value. We both take ART and know that we will have a healthy child," says Denys.



"THE HEALTHLINK PROJECT TEAM SAVED ME AND MY BABY"

Olesia lives in Kramatorsk. She was pregnant when the war started. Under bullets and rocket fire, the woman had to undergo important medical examinations, including HIV testing. Since the regional AIDS center was forced to evacuate due to the war, the woman was tested at the Ukrainian Resource Centre, a regional partner of the HealthLink Project. The result was positive.

After confirming the diagnosis, Olesia was explained that she could live a full life with HIV and give birth to a healthy child if she received antiretroviral therapy. However, instead of starting treatment, the woman disappeared and stopped answering calls. The social worker tried everything to reach Olesia.

"Finally, miraculously, Olesia answered my call and listened to me. I insisted on receiving ART. 'If you want to give birth to a healthy child, start taking medication. Right now, the fate of your baby is in your hands,' were the words that moved the woman. The very next day, she was in our office."

Olesia received help with getting registered and started treatment. In the summer of 2022, the woman gave birth to a healthy baby girl.

"It was so hard for me. I thought life had ended. Only now do I realise that if I hadn't started treatment then, I would've harmed my child. I'm so grateful to the HealthLink Project team that saved us," says Olesia.
